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Observed disparities in asthma burden are probably explained by a complex interaction of multiple factors including; patient-related factors, provider-related factors, health care system-related factors, social, and environmental factors.

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In the United States, health disparities are well documented in the care of patients with respiratory disorders, particularly among minorities who often have higher rates of disease and poorer health outcomes. Similarly, differences in health and health outcomes exist between differing socioeconomic groups, with lower.
