Henri Tajfel and John Turner devised their Social Identity Theory (SIT) in the 1970s to “supplement” Sherif’s Realistic Conflict Theory (RCT), which was developed in the 1950s and ‘60s. Both of these theories attempt to explain intergroup behaviour, and in particular conflict between groups.

Subsequently, Tajfel and his student John Turner developed the theory of social identity. They proposed that

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people have an inbuilt tendency to categorize themselves into one or more "ingroups", building a part of their identity on the basis of membership of that group and enforcing boundaries with other groups.

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and Tajfel explained that the mental processes that take place in formation of groups and prejudice views against outgroups can be broken down into three parts. The first basis of social categorization is to identify and understand people collectively.

Social Identity Theory (Tajfel, Turner) - Learning Theories

In 1979 Henri Tajfel and John Turner proposed a Social Identity Theory which held that there are three cognitive processes relevant to a persons being part of an in-group, or of an out-group. Such group membership being, depending upon circumstances, possibly associable with the appearance of prejudice and discrimination related to such perceived group membership.

Henri Tajfel's greatest contribution to psychology was social identity theory. Social identity is a person's sense of who

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they are based on their group membership(s). Tajfel (1979) proposed that the groups (e.g. social class, family, football team etc.) which people belonged to were an important source of pride and self-esteem.
